# ❖ New Certificate in Intellectual Property, Bob Pikowsky

- o Rolling out a new program in Intellectual Property certificate in Public Policy
- o Contacts for this certificate are John Walsh and Bob Pikowsky
- Targeting three major areas of student interest:
  - i. Engineering and Science majors who invent and want to protect their ownership interests especially those interested in patent law
  - ii. Students in business and those interested in entrepreneurship
  - iii. Anyone who wants to gain knowledge in intellectual property
- Requires 12 credits to complete the certificate; 3 credits of core (PUBP 4640) plus 9 credits 3000/4000 level electives. Electives range from pre-law, to law and policy, and intellectual property.
- Core course does not have any prerequisites nor will it be a prerequisite for other courses in the curriculum.

- i. Goal to educate the community around the problem of sexual violence on campus and that we all have a role to play.
- ii. Three staff members in VOICE Lee Helmken (Health Education/Prevention Specialist), Katy & Jennifer (Victim-Survivor Advocates)

## Sexual Violence

- i. Umbrella term for unwanted sexual attention, contact, or activity without consent; includes sexual harassment, stalking, intimate partner violence/dating violence, sexual assault and rape
- ii. It's important to understand what consent is especially when a student may discuss or disclose. Consent is Everything video (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=fGoWLWS4-kU)

# Supporting Sexual Violence

- i. Responsible employees" **must** report sexual harassment and sexual violence to the Title IX Coordinator. By definition, every employee at GT is a responsible employee.
- ii. You may not promise to keep a report confidential; Visit titleix.gatech.edu for more details.
- iii. Your reporting requirements apply when
  - 1. You witness an incident of sexual violence
  - 2. A student tells you they have (or may have) experienced sexual violence
  - 3. A student tells you they have committed or have been accused of sexual violence
  - 4. A student discloses in an email, paper, etc.
- See attached flow chart on your duty to report (Reporting Process)

- Remembering that you are not confidential, so be upfront with students: Here's how to politely interrupt to inform of mandatory reporting:
  - It sounds like you're about to tell me something I will have to report elsewhere
  - ii. I'm a mandatory reporter of violence between students
  - iii. I want to make sure you get all the support you need and I may not be the best person to have this conversation
  - iv. I'm not confidential but we have some great resources on campus who are
  - v. Thank you for coming to me about this. I'm glad you feel comfortable communicating.
- Impact of Sexual Violence there will be a range of emotions, feelings, and experiences and can manifest differently for where they are in the disclosure process.
- Supporting the Victim-Survivor
  - i. Believe the survivor
  - ii. Reassure the survivor
  - iii. Accept the survivor's feelings
  - iv. Use active listening skills
  - v. Provide support without taking over
  - vi. Give appropriate referrals and be willing to go with the victim if that would make them comfortable
  - How to Refer a student
    - Ask the student what's most comfortable walk the student to the Advocate's office (call before you go), Call and advocate can come to you, Or use the referral form for the Victim-Survivor Advocate
    - ii. Confidential Referral form (CRF) is for the Victim-Survivor Advocates and is an option for anonymous reporting; Must still report to the Title IX Coordinator even if the form is completed
    - iii. The CRF stays confidential with the Survivor Advocates, it's not shared with the Title IX Coordinator or GTPD;
    - iv. Can complete the CRF together with the student; Only include information the student shares (do not feel obligated to dig for details to complete the form)

- Advocates provide 24 hours support and information; meet in person or via phone, accompany student to hospital, counseling center, rape center, health center, court, or Title IX coordinator, etc. Ongoing support and followup including transportation to services, legal processes, safety planning, protective orders.
- Advocates can help a survivor with: class absences, requests for extensions on assignments and exams, incompletes, withdrawals, transfers, housing/residence life. Work closely with the Dean of Students Office for these academic interventions.
- Georgia Tech is committed to both reduce and prevent sexual violence, as well as changing the culture.
- o Ways to Get Involved:
  - i. Attend a Human Resources Training "Reporting and Responding to Sexual misconduct" June, August, and October dates; 3 hours in length and more comprehensive. Sign up at trains.gatech.edu
