

PEACHTREE | NOT ANOTHER EMAIL: SHORT FORM VIDEOS AS A TOOL FOR ADVISING

Tim Brown, Antwuan Holloway, and Ishmela Lyons-Uko | Georgia Tech

Launched in 2016, TikTok is a user-content-driven app used to facilitate media sharing on different subjects that are created by these users for consumption by a wider audience. This is in the format of short-form videos – videos that do not exceed 10 minutes in length. In December 2022, TikTok exceeded 1 billion users. Its exponential growth has a large impact on the tech arena, inspiring some in the tech realm – YouTube as well as Meta and it's subsidiaries – to adopt similar functionalities within their applications.

So, what can TikTok and short-form videos teach us about effective communication? How can the technologically challenged or averse advising practitioner create and utilize short-form videos to introduce information and measure engagement within their populations? This interactive presentation will engage in the following topics:

- An overview of wellness issues as it relates to task management at work
- Survey of established communication methods and their opportunities
- Review of TikTok and short-form videos as a part of the new media revolution
- How a higher education practitioner can utilize tools they are already familiar with to generate short-form videos
- Measuring engagement after short-form videos have been created

PIEDMONT | CHANGE YOUR WORDS, CHANGE YOUR MINDSET

Transitioning to college for young people can be extremely challenging without the right mindset, especially when considering an Institution with the academic rigor such as Georgia Tech. Student-athletes may encounter a compounded effect on their transition struggles as they balance athletic obligations coupled with a full-time course load. The mounting pressure to execute in their respective sport, in addition to performing well academically can be stress inducing. Along with that stress comes a mindset fixated on settling for less than what may be achievable. However, to become Everyday Champions, student-athletes must shift from a fixed mindset to a growth mindset to tackle life after sport and produce results both on and off the field. The goal of this presentation is to share our departmental perspectives on implementing a growth mindset into our student-athlete support practices.

TECHWOOD | SUPPORTING EXPLORING STUDENTS

The transition from high school to college, or even from one institution of higher learning to another, is filled with plans and opportunity. This time is also filled with choice. As students navigate the curricular requirements of their major of choice, some realize that reality does not align with their academic expectations. In such situations, students are presented with a choice that may impact the trajectory of the remainder of the academic journey. This is where exploratory advising, a reflective process that aligns students' interests, skills, goals, and passions, can bridge the gap between perception and reality.

This includes providing advising services - both individual and group - & programming to students considering a change of major, seeking assistance in major or minor exploration, seeking aid in career exploration, and those referred for help identifying or considering new academic paths.

NORTHSIDE | TEACH US HOW TO LEAD AND ADVISE YOU

Advisors can become so used to wearing different hats in our advisement sessions with students. Those hats include 'leader', 'coach', 'advising expert'; yet how often do we approach our sessions wearing the 'learner' hat? Most of the students we serve on our college campuses are Generation Z; therefore, their perspective of the world, life, and education, in many aspects differs from prior generations. This is the advisor's opportunity to become the 'student' in the advisement sessions, as we learn more about the students we serve. This session will explore the viewpoints that our students have about various subject matter, thus, sharpening and diversifying our advising approaches as well as cultivating healthy intergenerational dialogue.

PEACHTREE | IT TAKES A VILLAGE: HOW CAN WE HELP STUDENTS BE SUCCESSFUL IN THEIR PURSUIT OF CO-OPS AND INTERNSHIPS

PIEDMONT | HOW TO IMPROVE ADVISING & COACHING RAPPORT AND OUTCOMES THROUGH INTERIOR DESIGN

Improve your advising outcomes by setting the stage right: learn how to design your advising space for building optimal rapport, trust and openness that lead to positive change for students. This session presents the core of the findings of my research into the effect of the physical space on the advising interaction; it entailed a qualitative phenomenographic study through semi-structured interviews with incoming freshman and transfer students and comprehensive literature review. Participants will enhance their understanding of what makes an advising space work for both.

TECHWOOD | USING DISCORD TO ENGAGE STUDENTS AND FOSTER COMMUNITY

With more than 150 million people using Discord actively every month, students can be found in large numbers on this new-ish social media site. The exchange program at Georgia Tech started using this as a community-building tool in the Spring of 2023 – inviting students about to go, those who are currently out, and past students to join. In this session you will have the opportunity to learn more about Discord, how to use it and set one up, and tips and tricks on how to engage your students on the platform.

PEACHTREE | GROWTH MINDSET: WHY IT MATTERS TO STUDENTS AND HOW ADVISORS CAN FOSTER GROWTH

"I'm premed, but I don't want to take chemistry. It's too hard!" "I want to be a journalist, but I'm an introvert." "I hardly had to study in high school to get an A." Does this sound familiar? As an advisor, chances are you have encountered students who do not believe their abilities, interests, and personality can develop or change. Dr. Carol Dweck called this static view of ability a fixed mindset. Students who believe they can improve their knowledge and skills possess a growth mindset. We contend that advisors are able to help students cultivate a growth mindset in order to blossom into more creative and resilient learners.
